
Here is your ELA To Do List for today:

Notes -- Guided Practice -- Complete Homework

Provides the central source of **TENSION** and **DRAMA** that make stories interesting to read.





And then there is also......

EXTERNAL CONFLICT: when a character struggles with an outside force such as another character or nature.

INTERNAL CONFLICT: when a character mentally struggles with him/herself to overcome opposing feelings, needs, or desires; takes place in the character's mind

Literary Elements: CONFLICT GUIDED PRACTICE: A Constant Struggle

Ralph doesn't want to enlist in the Army as his brother Jake has. No one in his family is pressuring him to do so, but he feels torn.




Man vs. Self and Internal

In other words, you will be creating a co orful illustration that represents a Man vs. Man conflict; a co orful illustration that represents a Man vs. Society conflict; a CO Orful illustration that represent a Man vs. Nature conflict, and a CO Orful illustration that represents a Man vs. Self conflict.

By "CO Orful," that means that each of your four illustrations should be FULL OF COLOR by way of using a variety of colors via colored pencils, Twistables, and/or markers.

DO NOT use regular ink pen, #2 or mechanical pencils, and /or highlighters!

Make sure

- you include all four types of man vs. ____ conflicts;
- your illustrations include a VARIETY of colors via colored pencils, Twistables, and/or markers. DO NOT use regular ink pens, #2 or mechanical pencils, and/or highlighters [see previous slide];
- your illustrations consume the page -- meaning there should not be any leftover white or blank space in any of your four boxes;
- stick people (<u>if that's the best you can do</u>) have details --- hair, hat, eyes, mouth, nose, shirt, pants, dresses, shoes, etc.

Additionally, make sure <u>all four of your</u> <u>illustrations</u> are **APPROPRIATE** for school!!




If you have to ask if something is "appropriate," chances are <u>IT IS</u> <u>NOT</u>!!
